


SMSC Overview 2015 - 2016

Our spiral PSHE curriculum will provide pupils with:

- accurate and relevant knowledge
- opportunities to turn that knowledge into personal understanding
- opportunities to explore, clarify and if necessary challenge, their own and others' values, attitudes, beliefs, rights and responsibilities
- the skills and strategies they need in order to live healthy, safe, fulfilling, responsible and balanced lives.

Programme of Study

At Langstone Junior School we use the Portsmouth Programme of Study (PPoS), developed in conjunction with the PSHE Association and Portsmouth City Council (PCC), to plan and deliver regular lessons based on the needs of our pupils and current affairs. The PPoS identifies the key concepts and skills that underpin PSHE (Personal, Social, Health, Economics) education and supports the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of our pupils. It also allows them to question and challenge the world around them.

There are three core themes which broadly overlap and allow for flexibility.

These are:

- Health and Wellbeing
- Relationships
- Living in a Wider World

PCC have identified four additional priority areas that have been highlighted with colour coded symbols to help school address these areas as below.

- Abuse in relationships, including domestic violence
- Raising aspirations and developing economic wellbeing
- Maintaining a healthy weight
- Alcohol education

At LJS, we plan a tailored curriculum that meets the needs of our pupils. Whilst PSHE skills and concepts are taught as a discrete subject, there is a cross curricular approach to the implementation of PSHE with particular links to the computing curriculum. The LTP is a spiral programme which revisits themes, whilst increasing the challenge, broadening the scope, and deepening pupils' thinking.

Assessment


Opportunities for both Assessment <u>for</u> Learning and Assessment <u>of</u> Learning form part of our provision. Baseline assessment, in order to understand pupils' prior learning, is essential to ensure new learning is relevant and progress can be assessed.

Assessment should encompass teacher, peer and self-assessment. These will be recorded at the back of topic books as an ongoing record of PSHE achievement across the school.
