Use of Pupil Premium 2014/15

Background



The Pupil premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM), Service children and children who have been 'Looked After' continuously for more than 6 months. It also includes pupils eligible for FSM at any point in the last 6 years (known as the Ever 6 FSM measure).

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit. However, we will be held accountable for how we have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families. From September 2012, we were required to publish online information about how we have used the Premium. This will ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the attainment of pupils covered by the premium and the extra support that they receive.

Our School

In 2013-14 are due to receive approximately £100,500 for Pupil Premium. Other funding was added to this from the school budget to ensure that we could support as many pupils as possible; giving a range of experiences and opportunities as well as raising attainment and accelerating progress.
